




President's Message

BOOK CLUBS

**“And what is the use of a book,” thought Alice,
“without pictures or conversation?”**

Ah, these ubiquitous book clubs!! I’m writing this on June 16, known as Bloomsday. This wondrous day, commemorated by hundreds of book clubs worldwide, celebrates Leopold and Molly Bloom’s day long journey through the streets of Dublin, as described in James Joyce’s *Ulysses*. You can be sure each celebrant “Prosts” with a great and generous slug of Irish whiskey.

Now to the local Benicia book clubs! As I was asking around and discussing memberships, book selections, and meeting details, the answers were accompanied by faraway looks, reverent tones of voice—almost religious responses. Some people had been in book clubs longer than in their marriages. The Benicia Library has many varied, noontime groups. The Benicia Friendship Club sports five, and Bookshop Benicia, of course, has sponsored several. The Association of University Women (AAUW) and the Benicia Yacht Club meet monthly in their separate groups. The variations of club combinations, book selections, and structures are endless. Some meet for dinner, a luncheon, or just for a group discussion.

In one of my book clubs, we trotted to San Francisco to hear Billy Collins read his poetry. Another time we celebrated Ann Frank’s ninetieth birthday. We have experienced the losses of members, of members’ spouses and children, the births of grand and great-grandchildren. Perhaps these personal connections are the cement of the group. The exposure to the varied literary selections and the spirited discussions are frosting on the cake.

With the growing interest in book clubs, many publications now contain suggestions for discussion. Oprah’s book selections have long been prominent sources for selections by clubs. The Nobel Prize and the Pulitzer are others. I, myself, prize the Booker Awards. The selections seem so eclectic, but many become widespread choices of book clubs. A look at the weekly best sellers is a prominent

indication of book choices. Interestingly, three recent non-fiction books,—*Educated: A Memoir* by Tara Westover; *Caste: A Brief History of Racism, Sexism, Classism, Ageism, Homophobia, Xenophobia, Religious Intolerance, and Reasons for Hope* by Isabel Wilkerson; and *Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind* by Yuval Harari—were very popular choices. Now with the interest in “Black Lives Matter,” we see another trend. In fiction, across the board, these titles occur and reoccur—*The Vanishing Half* by Brit Bennett, William Kent Krueger’s *Ordinary Grace*, *American Dirt* by Jeanine Cummins, *Where the Crawdad Sings* by Delia Owens, and *Little Fires Everywhere* by Celeste Ng—alas, only to name a few. It would be so interesting to hear from you readers which book has been the special joy of your book-club experience. During this last year, for many, these books and our book clubs were healing experiences for our souls and our sanity.

California



I know it's fashionable to bash California and certainly our beloved state has serious problems, but I want to share some good news from Bloomberg. In an article dated June 14, 2021, Matthew A Winkler writes:

“No one anticipated the latest data readout showing the Golden State has no peers among developed economies for expanding GDP (gross domestic product), creating jobs, raising household income, manufacturing growth, investment in innovation, producing clean energy and unprecedented wealth through its stocks and bonds. All of which underlines Governor Gavin Newsom's announcement last month of the biggest state tax rebate in American history.”

Winkler also notes that California added 1.3 million people to its non-farm payrolls since April of last year. A number equivalent to the entire workforce of Nevada. Its household income growth of \$164 billion was almost as much as the combined growth of Texas, Florida and Pennsylvania. Among the five largest economies in the world California's growth outperforms the U.S., Germany, and Japan, trailing only China.

All of this is good news coming off a very rough period of pandemic closure, death and destruction. The cherry on top for California is that so far we have done better than forty-one other states in handling COVID19 and keeping people alive. So, get your vaccination, encourage those you love to do the same, and get out there and enjoy the Golden State.
